

The season of Lent traditionally focuses on spiritual disciplines; prayer, contemplation, giving something up and fasting are some of the common ones. It seems to me that the word "discipline" has a negative connotation in our modern world; it suggests some sort of corrective, or punishment, or at least an uncomfortable sacrifice. However I don't believe that spiritual disciplines are really intended to be anything like these negative connotations.

At the PC(USA) conference in January which I attended on the Foundations of Discipleship, a wonderful book was highlighted by Mark Thibodeaux, called "Armchair Mystic", which details some of the first steps of the practice of contemplative prayer. In the first chapter, the author describes the value of ritual, or discipline that in his mind is anything but a chore or a sacrifice. He shares a wonderful story which has stuck with me when considering my own daily prayer life. Here is the essence of the story:

An elderly widow friend once told me that she thinks of her husband most when crossing a bridge. She explained that early in their life together she and her husband developed a habit of kissing each other every time they crossed a bridge. She could not remember how this little ritual began but they were always faithful to it. "If he was driving and the traffic was heavy, we would have to wait for the next stop, but we never forgot our kiss" she said. To this day she cannot cross a bridge without sensing his presence. (Thibodeaux, <u>Armchair Mystic</u>, 2001, p. 11)

Thibodeaux writes that a ritual such as the lovely one described above "sacramentalizes" the concrete world. If you pardon the pun, it creates a "bridge" between the transcendent (love) and the ordinary (driving across a bridge). So he says it is with our daily prayer lives. Many people say they have little rituals or disciplines in their prayer lives. They sit in the same chair and begin at the same time every day. This is to help the bridge between the transcendent and the ordinary. But the purpose is to help us to keep a regular time and place so that we keep in regular touch with one who loves us – God through Jesus Christ. The discipline of that regular time and place becomes not an obligation or a chore, but an avenue of spiritual continues on page 2.

Weekday School Up Date...

Keeping Our Kids Safe

Recently teachers and staff at the weekday school had a meeting to review playground policies. If adults other than teachers/staff need access to our school, we require them to check in at either the church or the school offices and receive a lanyard (identification tag) that is easily recognizable to school staff.


We are grateful to the team of members who have helped to plan the project but now we need to finish it. Our fund raising

Strengthening the McCabe Neighborhood Partnerships

The **Uptown Metro Ministry Group** continues to be actively involved with the McCabe Neighborhood in northern Baltimore City (just south of Govans Presbyterian) through Habitat for Humanity (H4H). H4H is currently at work to rehab more than 20 properties, offering the opportunity for individuals and families to own a home and thereby help to anchor neighborhood revitalization. But we have always understood our commitment to this neighborhood as more than construction. The vision is that our engagement might contribute to the creation of a vibrant, safe, and mutually supportive neighborhood in a place that has been plagued by gangs, drug dealers, and decay.

Working with the McCabe Neighborhood Association and the Greater Homewood Community Corporation we have chosen to hire a community organizer to work directly with the neighborhood and to facilitate a more robust engagement of the churches in our ministry group. We are excited about this new level of commitment as a tangible way of living out the Gospel of loving neighbors.

The project's steering committee, comprised of pastors in the Uptown Metro Ministry Group, continues to meet at a monthly lunch for fellowship, planning, and support. We are seeking ways to bring ruling elders into leadership positions in the group as well.


