 What's happening at Brown Memorial Woodbrook Like most years, I suppose, 2015 had its ups and downs. Although fear seems to have this country in a tight grip, 200 nations agreed to try to save the environment in 2015. While there were earthquakes, floods and droughts in many places across the globe, marriage equality became the law of the land in the United States. Despite increasing numbers of refugees fleeing terrorism and war, a South Carolina judge threw out the convictions of nine civil rights protestors from 1961. Although there were riots in Baltimore this spring and gun violence is setting records across the nation, gas prices are low and the economy is improving.

For us at Brown Woodbrook, 2015 was a year of change. Scott Wilson completed his Interim service with this congregation, and I was called and installed as your Pastor. Susan Gonzalez retired and her gifts and service to this congregation were celebrated, while Peter Morey was welcomed as our new Music Director. I have some exciting news.

The Baltimore Presbytery has officially formed a new Guatemala Partnership which was formally signed at the November 14 Gathering at First Presbyterian Church of Howard County. Our new partner is **CEDEPCA** (the Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America) and is a recognized partner organization of the PCUSA. CEDEPCA's Director, Judith Castañeda, was in town for the signing. Also at the meeting, the Guatemala Partnership Workgroup, of which I am a member along with seven other Pastors and lav leaders across different churches in our Baltimore Presbytery, presented a workshop about the Partnership and the work CEDEPCA does in Guatemala.

So, a little about CEDEPCA. CEDEPCA is an independent ecumenical institution serving Central America's churches. It is an educational center that provides safe, accepting, creative spaces where women and men from many different Christian traditions can deepen their faith while strengthening their ability to confront the key issues facing their communities.

CEDEPCA seeks to form thoughtful, compassionate disciples of Jesus Christ whose world is big enough to include all God's children and those who care for all of God's creation.

CEDEPCA offers people the tools to eradicate violence and injustice in their world, especially violence against women and children

CEDEPCA has four programs: Women's Ministry, Disaster Ministry, Biblical and Theological Education and Intercultural Encounters. Visiting Guatemala and witnessing God's work through this amazing organization was an incredible experience for me, and I hope many of you will consider a similar trip in the future.

If you are interested in learning more and possibly going on the next trip scheduled tentatively for sometime this April, our workgroup is holding an information session at Central Presbyterian Church on York Road and Stevenson Lane on Wednesday, January 13th at 7:00 P.M. I have been in conversation with Patricia Short about allocating funds for CEDEPCA and hope we can find a way to make that happen. I also ask that all of you put CEDEPCA and the people of Guatemala on your prayer list. Finally, CEDEPCA has a mailing list you can sign up for that will enable you to receive their bi-monthly email update. I will have a clipboard in the lobby so you can sign up for that. I hope to see some of you on January 13 at Central Pres.

Common Ground on the Hill

Acoustic Blues Master Scott Ainslie February 5, 2016 8 PM Fellowship Hall

"Scott is the kind of musician they don't make any more, in the mold of the late Pete Seeger – unpretentious, dead serious about his craft, dedicated to preserving traditional American music and instruments ... and so versatile he can make you weep one moment over the story of a dying steel town ("all these houses for sale,

and ain't none of them sold") and snicker appreciatively the next at a driving Mississippi blues song full of earthy innuendo." -Washington Post

Armed with a variety of instruments – vintage guitars, a fretless gourd banjo, a one-string, homemade diddley bow (aka cigar box guitar) and carefully chosen historical personal anecdotes of his encounters with senior musicians across the South – Scott Ainslie brings the history, roots music, and sounds of America alive. Ainslie has received numerous awards and grants for his work documenting and presenting traditional music. He has been a Public Fellow at UNC-Chapel Hill, and received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA, a federal agency in Washington DC) and the Folklife Section of the North Carolina Arts Council. In 2000, Ainslie was also

> presented with an Indie (the Independent Weekly Triangle Arts Award, Durham, NC), with the National Slide Guitar Festivals' Living Heritage Award, and

the 20th Annual Sam Ragan Fine Arts Award for "outstanding contributions to the fine arts" (from St. Andrew's Presbyterian College, Laurinburg, NC).
